#### Queensland State Budget 2020/21 – Priority Support for Western Queensland Communities

We write to you under the banner of the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils – the 21 councils forming the North West Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils (NWQROC); the Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD); and the South West Queensland Local Government Association (SWQLGA) – refer to Appendix 1 for further details.

We have formed this Alliance given the common challenges we share in serving the vast communities of Western Queensland and the desire to focus on key priorities that will provide the best opportunities for our communities to thrive and prosper.

As you would know through your roles as Deputy Premier, Treasurer and former Minister for Local Government, Western Queensland supports a diverse range of industries and contributes significantly (especially on a per capita basis) to Gross State Product. You would also appreciate that the communities of Western Queensland have been battling prolonged and severe drought, which has adversely impacted not only local and regional economies, but the very existence of many communities as individuals and families move away in search of jobs and other opportunities.

For this reason, we have resolved to present to you just one item for consideration in developing the 2020/21 Queensland State Budget. Whilst our list of community priorities is naturally and understandably large, the 21 councils of the Western Queensland Alliance believe increased State Government investment in roads infrastructure (both State controlled and Local Government) will provide the most beneficial and far reaching impact in each of our regions and communities.

The research and studies are clear – a myriad of analysis has been undertaken over the years from Infrastructure Australia, Regional Development Australia, your own State Government, the LGAQ, other industry groups and individual councils – roads act as enabling infrastructure, supporting economic growth and social connection / development and in this case many of the State Government's *Advancing Queensland Priorities*.

Rather than present you with more facts and figures as we are sure you understand the arguments, we want to suggest how best we believe increased investment in our State's road infrastructure could be reasonably achieved.

We make this suggestion being cognisant of the Government's work to streamline State Government grants to Local Government and in recognition that there are existing programs and frameworks that work well, so our aim is to use what already exists.

As part of the 2020/21 Queensland State Budget, the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils respectively requests the State Government:

1. Reverse the long-term trend of declining funding allocations to the North West District, Central West District and South West District of the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) under the Queensland Transport and Roads Investment Program (QTRIP). Funding allocations to these Districts continue to be the lowest in the State at 2.7, 2.5 and 2.0 percent respectively – refer to Appendix 2 for a summary of QTRIP allocations across Queensland.

With forecasts demonstrating these allocations are to be reduced even further in 2021, 2022 and 2023, the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils requests that this situation be addressed, not by reallocating funding across TMR Districts, but by significantly increasing the Governments investment in QTRIP state-wide. At a very minimum, the QTRIP allocations to the North West, Central West and South West TMR Districts should be maintained over the long term at no less than 10% in aggregate of the State's total QTRIP budget to provide certainty and confidence to Western Queensland councils and communities. Based on available information and our calculations, we understand that this would result in an annual increase of \$94.5M or 39% across the North West, Central West and South West TMR Districts.

2. Build on the success of the Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme (TIDS) and the existing framework of Regional Roads and Transport Groups (RRTGs) by supporting a new investment pipeline in TIDS for the three western Queensland RRTGs. In summary, we are asking for the TIDS allocations to the North West, Outback and South West RRTGs to immediately be increased by 25 percent (from existing 2019/20 allocations) until 2021/22 and then increased by 50 percent in 2022/23 and 2023/24 (refer to table below) on the basis that each of the RRTGs prove their capacity and capability to expend 100 percent of these increased TIDS allocations.

3. As part of the above and as a commitment to 'place based' policy and program delivery, immediately review the current TIDS Policy to re-adjust the current 50/50 matching component acknowledging the constrained budgets of Western Queensland Councils. At a minimum, we suggest 80 percent State Government and 20 percent Local Government matching arrangements, which, to some degree mirrors the matching arrangements under many of the National Partnership Agreements between the Australian Government and individual States.

As partners in Government we understand there are many competing and worthy priorities to invest State Government funding. However, our collective experience as 21 Mayors and 106 Councillors tells us that our suggested approach as presented in this submission will deliver the biggest impact in our communities. We also believe it will provide the certainty and confidence our councils and communities so desperately need to forward plan, especially on the back of drought. Consequently, the need for increased investment in Western Queensland roads will also feature as a key priority as part of the Western Queensland Alliance of Council's State Election Platform.

We would welcome the opportunity to have a face to face discussion with you and / or your Departmental representatives about our State Budget submission and will follow up with your office in the coming weeks.


